JOHN THOMAS, HIGH JUMPER EXTRAORDINARY

John Curtis Thomas is better known to the world as John Thomas. high jumper extraordinary. It has been said that his left foot, the foot that he starts with, is to high jumping as Birgitt Nilsson's vocal cords are to Wagnerian opera. It has also been said that he is the most exciting athlete in track and field since the arrival of Herb Elliott. He was the first to jump over seven feet indoors. He made the highest jump indoors or outdoors, seven feet, one and onequarter inches.

John's potential was first seen by Tom Duffy, his coach at Rindge Tooh in Cambridge, Massachusetts, where he went to high school. This coach taught him to use the straddle roll instead of the old-fachioned belly-roll. It took a year for him to master the straddle roll but he is still using it. Before he got out of high school, his jumps earned him a trip to Japan with a touring AAU track and field group where he jumped six feet, ten and five-eighths inches.

John became famous at Boston University under Doug Raymond and Ed Clanagen. At his first big indoor meet, he set a new world's record of six feet, eleven and three-fourths inches. He broke that with his first seven foot jump and he broke that with his wimming jump at the National indoor championships of seven feet, one and onequarter inches.

Then came a tragedy. John suffered a serious injury to his left take-off foot. It was ripped and torn when he caught it in an elevator door. A delicate operation and skin grafts were performed and the foot was as good as ever but he missed an entire, outdoor track season. He took it easy and exercised lightly. The first time he jumped after his injury, he jumped six feet, three inches. Several days later, he jumped six feet, five inches. His best jump during practice was six feet, nine inchesocoln his first meet after his injury, he jumped, without missing once, oo six feet, ten and one-half inches and seven feet, and one-half inchese In 1960 he went to the Olympics in Homes There he faced unaccustomed pressure. He placed third against two Russiansooo

John Thomas is an easy-moving person and he carries himself with a reserved dignity. He is six feet, five and one-half inches tall and weighs 194 pounds.... In high jumping, he is an icicle in an event notorious for its psychological havoc. Maybe in a few years, John Thomas will again look at a towering bar seven feet or more above the ground, take a deep breath, run and jump -- jump to victory and a new world's record.

His senior year, he was voted first team"All American"

fullback.

After his greduation from Syracuse, Jim met & Miss Sue Jones while on leave from Fort Benning in Columbus, Georgia. After several months, Miss Sue Jones was Mrs. Sue Brown.

In 1957, Jim was signed by the Cleveland Browns of the National Football League, and from that day on, he steadily gained in skill until today Jim Brown is considered by many the greatest player in the world.

Jim Brown is a lover of fine music and clothes and resides in a tiny frame house in a Cleveland suburb. He works in a huge, 70,000 seat capacity home in downtown Cleveland.
